Elkhart Tree Advisory Committee-July update

We accomplished Elkhart's tree inventory of 'Right Of Way' and Parks trees on June 18th.

We had an amazing 20 (!) volunteers show up to assist us.

We accomplished the whole inventory in 1 very hot morning and enjoyed our lunch at the Village Hall.

The Trees Forever organization delivered the spreadsheet of inventory data to us that same week. We inventoried 170 trees of 40 different species. Our Advisory Committee member, Jeff Harris (who has the most expertise in botany and trees), is reviewing the data, and we will have that organized before our Tree Advisory Committee meeting.

Our Tree Advisory Committee will meet on Monday, July 8, at the Village Hall at 6:30.

Illinois is home to several firefly genera and many different firefly species, which can be identified based on flash patterns, flash colors, and behavior. Join the Elkhart Historical Society Friday July 26th for their program entitled **The World of Our Amazing Fireflies**, presented by Allen Yow. Participants will learn about the life cycle of fireflies, how to identify, and protect them.



Yow, an avid bird watcher for more than 40 years, became curious about fireflies one night in his yard when he realized the variety of lighting patterns and colors the fireflies displayed. Whether called fireflies, lightning bugs, glow worms or moon bugs, Yow said they're all synonymous, but their unique illumination differences separate the individual groups, and allow us to identify them. This ability is the result of a complicated chemical reaction, that allows them to find a mate in the right group. Habitats are critical to every living thing- -including these amazing 'beacons' of the summer evenings. Come learn more and help them to continue adding their sparkle to our lives for generations to come.

WHAT MAKES ELKHART UNIQUE AND SPECIAL

The Fall of John Shockey and the Rise of J. W. Saunders

We left off last month with "things were going to take a big turn" for John Shockey, the founder of our town Elkhart. I will quote for Gwen Suttory Rosenfeld's book Echoes from The Branches what she wrote about her ancestor John Shockey:

"Happiness did not stay with John for long; despair came in the Fall of 1856 as family history tells me John was dealt the worst of blows - his crops failed. He was a ruined man; he had to have a public sale, one of the largest around at that time. This was held in March 1857."

It is unknown whether it was weather or insects or disease that caused his crop failure. To finish the rest of John and Catherine Shockey's story, they had seventeen children (no multiple births) - six girls and eleven boys. Eight died before they came to Elkhart, two shortly after they arrived here, and two were born here in Elkhart. The surviving seven children all lived to the ages of 67 to 91 except Jeremiah who died in the Civil War at Bolivar, Tennessee. The other four sons who fought in the Civil War survived their service. Neither parent lived to see their sons go off to War because Catherine became ill and died on November13, 1858, and John died one year later on November 25, 1859, at the age of 53. But do not despair because some of his descendants stayed in Elkhart and were able to eventually buy some land because Gwen Rosenfeld talks about going out to her "Grandpa and Grandma Shockey's farm out the south road".

When John Shockey died Elkhart was not much of a town. The town was laid out on the western slope of Elkhart hill parallel to the new railroad tracks that came through town in 1853. There was a horse mill that was brought here and converted to a warehouse right next to the tracks for the railroad company's use. Very few houses had been built, but one of the first other buildings was another "warehouse" located on the present corner of Latham and Governor Oglesby Streets which was actually a general store that sold any and all supplies that pioneers would need. It was owned and operated by J. W. Saunders who also became Elkhart's first postmaster and railroad agent (because both the "post office" and the railroad ticket booth both conveniently happened to be located in his store).



The Shockey tombstones are in the Elkhart Cemetery just south of Governor Oglesby's tomb. Please note that these headstones are not the original ones (which would have been smaller and very worn by time and weather) but ones replaced by "the 4th and 5th generation" of Shockey's.
