

January 2024 Village Board Meeting

I have been looking at materials on grant funding for trees from different government agencies. I have seen this as a suggestion [to prepare to be attractive grant applicant] in their materials: Intent: Many local Urban & Community Forestry programs began through the efforts of local community groups, and these groups often serve as a catalyst to encourage active local urban forest resource management for the long term. This performance element aims to ensure that community residents and program stakeholders are informed, educated, and engaged in the development and implementation of a sound community forestry program at the local level.

I am asking that the Village Board establish a formal Tree Board, as an advisory group.

This advisory group "BE," the following:

- 1. An organization that is formalized to advise on the establishment, conservation, protection, and maintenance of urban and community trees and forests.
- 2. A board of community members whose primary members are appointed by local elected officials to advise policymakers on tree ordinances, policies, and management.
- 3. A group that will investigate and prepare the Village to apply for possible appropriate grant funding.

I am suggesting at least 1 board member should be on the board.

I hope to have a list of "primary board member candidates" at the January VB meeting. I would like to be one of those board members. Would this interest you? As far as time commitment, I believe we could organize and move forward with a single monthly meetup of the Board... in person OR electronic, and each pursue research and development on these above objectives... as each of our schedules allow.

What Makes Elkhart Unique and Special

There have been a lot of pictures taken of our beautiful Elkhart Hill - for weddings, senior pictures, and "just because". Here are "before" and "now" pictures of our hill that is 777 feet above sea level, or 520 feet higher than the surrounding flat land. No one really knows exactly when the "cut" in Elkhart Hill was made and exactly when the wooden bridge was first built to span it. We'll keep researching and see if we can come up with a definitive answer for you in the future. What we know is that sometime after the Civil War a cut was made through Elkhart Hill to lower the grade for horse and wagon teams coming in through the east side of the hill. Initially there was only room for one team wagon to go through at a time. The grade of the hill was probably between 6% - 8% grade so as not to stress the horses going up or coming down the hill and to prevent resulting accidents.

To avoid having to travel from the Oglehurst mansion to the bottom of the hill and then back up to the Gillett Chapel (which was built in 1890), a wooden bridge was constructed. As the story goes it was built so that Emma Gillett Oglesby "wouldn't get her petticoats dirty". The wooden bridge was the one over which Governor Oglesby's funeral cortège traveled on their way from the Governor's mansion (Oglehurst) to the Gillett Chapel in 1899. After the death of her brother, John P. Gillett, Emma ordered the construction of the John P. Gillett Memorial Arch to commemorate him. Completed in 1915, the bridge was designed with the help of Emma's son, Lt. Governor John Oglesby. Employing the best structural knowledge of the day, it is the first poured-concrete bridge, privately owned, to span a public road. By this time most travel was by car, and if a car could make it up the hill without shifting, it was considered "worth the purchase"! The Gillett Memorial Arch is now listed in the National Register of Historic Places.
