What Makes Elkhart Unique and Great

Elkhart was/is located on the famous "Route 66" highway (maybe not as famous as Chicago or Los Angeles), but this is not the first time Elkhart has been the "center" of a famous roadway. By the time "Columbus discovered the Americas", Native Americans had developed an intersecting and connecting network of roads/trails/traces over most of North America. Of the natives of the Illinois Confederation, Cahokia (home of mound building Indians) in the south and Peoria in the north were the sites of two large semi-urban agricultural settlements.

After the War of 1812 (remember were not a state yet), many Native American tribes of the Illinois Territory, hoping to maintain their culture and way of life, allied themselves with the fur traders of British upper Canada. The frontiersmen (of the so-called American Bottom) grouped around Cahokia saw this as a threat. Native Americans + British = threat. Territorial Governor Ninian Edwards recruited 350 frontiersmen into a troop of Illinois Rangers and headed northward from the "American Bottom" on the road/trail/trace. They came up into the territory occupied by the Kickapoo around present-day Lincoln and won control over the Sangamon River and then on up to the region around Peoria, destroying Native American property and villages. Edwards became a hero to his fellow frontiersmen; thus they named the trail/trace they took on their March as the Edwards Trace.


As a result of this March, central Illinois was then open for agriculture settlement and the Edwards Trace became very busy. If you look back at historical maps you will see that the earliest settlements in Illinois were in the south with the convergence of the Ohio and Mississippi Rivers and gradually moved northward. The Edwards Trace became the primary route for Euro-American settlers into the Sangamon River valley area. Furs, Buffalo hides, and deer hides came southward as salt, gunpowder, guns, agricultural tools, textiles, and other supplies needed for frontier life went northward toward the growing settlements. All this commercial trading up and down created ruts in the Trace.

Two inventions of transportation in the first half of the 1800s changed the importance and use of the Edwards Trace. Shallow-draft steamboats began to steam up and down the Illinois River, which runs parallel to the Trace. The Alton & Sangamon railroad (the "iron horse") was chartered in 1847 to improve transportation in and out of the area served by the Edwards Trace, and as the new rails were laid, the old trail fell into inactivity. Would you rather walk on foot, or ride on a steamboat or in a railroad car which are much faster and less exhausting for you? And now with automobiles, sections of Interstate 55 and Interstate 155 also parallel the Edwards Trace line today.

The Edwards Trace connected what are now the communities of Cahokia, Edwardsville, Springfield, ELKHART, and Peoria. Only small segments of the Edwards Trace are still visible today because most of it has been plowed up for agriculture purposes or buried under asphalt or cities. A small segment is located around Lake Springfield and around Elkhart. So we have been the "center" of famous routes for quite some time.





The Elkhart Historical Society is once again offering guided wildflower walks on Elkhart Hill, every Saturday in April starting April 6^{th.} with two walks a day at 10a and 2p, at a cost of \$15 per adult \$10 per child. Reservations are required and should be made by calling 217 947 2238. An optional lunch can be reserved on the same form, at a total cost for adult of \$25 and child \$15. All tours leave from the Country Bumpkin at 103 Gov. Oglesby St. Elkhart, IL.

On the morning of Saturday April 27, the Historical Society was fortunate in getting Biology Professor Tony Rothering, from LLCC, to demonstrate the banding of both migratory and local songbirds during special tours at 730 a, 9a and 1030a. The 2p tour will feature both flowers and birds with the help of our amazing birders, Dr. Lara Borgerson, Joe Funk and Rhetta Jack.

Rothering is a federally permitted bander, who last year successfully recorded and released over 120 birds during his annual Elkhart Hill banding session. The event is done during the spring migration on Elkhart Hill because of its significance as an incredibly biodiverse "island" (oasis) to the birds. The hill's forest measures approximately 600 acres of mature hardwoods, which is surrounded primarily by monocultures of corn and soybeans fields where very few hedge rows or groves of trees remain. For the many species of migrating warblers Elkhart Hill offers a much-needed rest and refueling stop, on their journey north to breeding grounds in the upper Midwest and Canada. We are hopeful that some of these travelers will be among those banded on Saturday April 27, you won't want to miss it. Rothering's work helps to catalog the changes in migration patterns caused, in part by climate change and loss of habitat.

If you have a group of 10-20 you can arrange to have a private tour of the April wildflowers by calling 217 947 2238, and if scheduled on Wednesday-Friday lunch can be included. The cost is \$15 per person and lunch can be included for \$10 or be ordered off the menu.

Not one, but three headliners will present the next Elkhart Historical Society Dinner Lecture on Friday, April 26, 2024, "How to be Successful with Native Plants" (to support pollinators).

The trio comprised of Susan Helm of the Springfield Parks Foundation, Mona Maas, creator of Elkhart's Pollinator Habitat, and Joan Moody from Lincoln Welcome Garden, will encourage and delight you with their sagas of native



plants and how to ensure their success- - which almost simultaneously assures pollinators survival as well. All three are University of Illinois Master Naturalists who are active retirees spreading the word for Pollinators in our local communities. Joanie developed and maintains the Logan County Welcome Garden with the City of Lincoln; Susan has developed more than 10+ Native Plant Gardens with the Springfield Park District; Mona did the same at our Pollinator Habitat with the Village of Elkhart.


Join them for an entertaining presentation on their successes (and failures) in developing native plant gardens, large and small. Bees, butterflies, and other pollinators are on the decline worldwide, but you can make a difference for them right in your own garden. Monarch caterpillars feed exclusively on the leaves of milkweed, the only host plant for this iconic butterfly species. Eradication of milkweed both in agricultural areas as well as in landscapes is one of the primary reasons that monarchs are in trouble today!

They will share "How to's" on introducing native plants into your landscaping to support pollinators, as well as a list of sources of native plants for this area. They will inspire you to begin (or continue) to develop your own native plant plot! The trio plans to bring plugs of rose milkweed for everyone, for which a \$2 donation to cover the cost would be appreciated.

The Lecture will be held at Horsefeather's Wild Hare Café in Elkhart. Doors open at 5 p.m. and dinner service will begin at 5:30 p.m. The two entrees will be breaded chicken with a lemon cream sauce or beef stroganoff. The cost is \$45 per person. Reservations are required and should be made by calling 217 947 2238. The deadline for reservations and payment is April 15.
